### ***Here are eight benefits of having a PTA:***

**1. Leverage volunteer power.** Parents are ready and willing to help implement school improvement programs. Because PTA is a national organization with tremendous recognition, local units attract individuals with leadership skills—many times with business experience in a variety of disciplines.

**2. Improve communications.** Frequently, one of the PTA's responsibilities is keeping the entire school community informed of current events, issues, and accomplishments. In addition, regularly scheduled meetings are an opportunity for you to share information with members.

**3. See measurable results.** More than 85 rigorous academic research studies indicate that kids do better when parents are involved. Grades are higher. Test scores improve. Attendance increases. Research points to these real, beneficial outcomes.



**4. Discover more dollars.** Local PTAs are self funding. Local PTAs often organize fundraising events, the proceeds from which support school based programs, building maintenance and improvements, and educational and social events that build a closer school community among students, parents, and faculty.

**5. Tap into programs.** From health and safety topics to collaborating with teachers and community members to fundraising, PTA programs are ready to use and produce results. The Reflections Program is the largest arts competition in the nation for school children. Many schools use it as an enhancement to art instruction provided at no cost to the school. National PTA's *National Standards for Parent/Family Involvement Programs*—endorsed by nearly 100 education, health, and parent involvement organizations. National PTA provides presenters to give workshops that encourage collaboration among all stakeholders in a child's education: parents, educators, and the community. The National Standards also led to the creation of Parent Involvement Schools of Excellence Certification, designed to promote and acknowledge great parent involvement in schools. Three for Me encourages parents to get involved in their children's education by volunteering three hours to school-related activities.

**6. Boost children's well-being.** PTAs focus on what children need to be successful students, including good nutrition, health, and overall well-being. Whether the issue is school safety, physical fitness, or healthy breakfasts, PTA works with school administrators to ensure that children are prepared to succeed.

**7. Collaborate with informed parents.** Involved parents understand the challenges schools face and become part of the solution. They support improving education, both locally and legislatively. PTAs also can help parents overcome barriers to being involved in their children's schools. By developing a closer relationship with parents, schools experience increased student achievement.

**8. Fulfill NCLB obligations.** PTAs can help schools fulfill the parent involvement requirement of the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB). PTA understands the needs behind NCLB. In fact, it's National PTA's definition of parent involvement that is used in NCLB. Having a PTA often satisfies the law's conditions.
